Liberty Hill Soldiers' Huts

A one-day living history event, "To Render this Place as Tenable as Possi**ble**" on **December 7**, will showcase the first of our recreated soldiers' huts, based on our most current understanding of these small wooden houses that Pennsylvania soldiers built as shelter upon Liberty Hill as they prepared to hold the line of liberty and maintain their discipline through a harsh winter. This event is just a taste of 1776 **REAL TIME REVOLUTION™** programs to come!

Thanks to support from Americana Corner, beginning in 2025, we will begin expanding our recreated Liberty Hill encampment. The new soldiers' huts will tangibly illustrate life on Liberty Hill and serve as a stage to dramatically reenact moments of triumph and tragedy that occurred on this ground in 1776 and 1777.

Winter Quarters Events

ort Ticonderoga's innovative approach to telling the story of America's 250th takes center stage with REAL TIME REVOLUTION™, a multi-year program that day by day, moment by moment, brings the story to life in real time. Our unique approach to the 250th anniversary chronicles the whole period, with the rich narratives of different armies, peoples and climactic events that shaped the fight for independence from 1774-1777.

As we march into Winter Quarters, 2024-2025, visitors step into Ticonderoga in the winter of 1774-1775, on the eve of the Revolution, and explore the unfamiliar colonial world in which Americans were British subjects and the garrison of Fort Ticonderoga was part of the community surrounding it.

A series of upcoming living history events during Winter Quarters will explore the human side of the British soldiers and their families who garrisoned Ticonderoga during this time. From exploring practical and clothing needs during the winter to the family life of the garrison, including women's role in the military economy, Winter Quarters visitors will gain a deeper understanding of this peacetime garrison and their relationship with the broader community on the eve of the Revolution.

◀ The "His Majesty's Garrison of Ticonderoga" event on February 15 will examine family life itself for the British garrison, especially women's role in the military economy, making soap, laundering, and dairying. Discover peacetime luxuries like a communal mess table enjoyed by respectable soldiers and their families.

▼ On March 15 during "The Market for Produce Goods," visitors will go beyond the mechanics of weapons to examine the close relationship between the British Guard of Fort Ticonderoga and the surrounding civilian community. This immersive event highlights market day at Ticonderoga, a local tradition that lived on after the American capture of Fort Ticonderoga in 1775.

America's First Victory!

Join Fort Ticonderoga May 9-11, 2025, and be part of history! The 250th anniversary of Ethan Allen's capture of Fort Ticonderoga will come to life through a dramatic weekend and nighttime reenactment event titled NO QUARTER. These three days will chronicle the march of the Green Mountain Boys through Vermont as the British garrison remained unaware of the shots heard around the world at Lexington and Concord. Join visitors and dignitaries to witness the real story of Ethan Allen, Benedict Arnold, and the mere minutes required to subdue the British guard and secure America's first victory of the Revolution.



Collections and Curatorial departments prepare for a new year of the Revolutionary Anthology exhibit series.



Get Hands-on with Exhibits

N ew tactile components were added to the "A Revolu-tionary Anthology: Power of Place" exhibit over the summer. The elements are designed to enhance the experience for all, while also creating ways to engage with the exhibit for blind and low-vision guests. Matt Gesualdi of Proximity Studio created raised relief maps based on consultations with Dr. Cheryl Fogle-Hatch from MuseumSenses.

The raised relief maps offer the opportunity to feel the landscapes of the Revolutionary War that the exhibit explores. Dr. Fogle-Hatch works to develop multisensory experiences in galleries, museums, and other cultural organizations across the country.

Fellow Develops Tactile Exhibits



Hayden Slentz-Kessler, this summer's Edward W. Pell exhibition fellow, helped to develop and prototype new tactile components for future exhibits. During the 10-week fellowship, Hayden worked closely with museum staff and our accessibility consultants to conceptualize future exhibits. Hayden reviewed objects and themes for the 2025 installation of "A Revolutionary Anthology" focusing on the theme of Subjects, Citizens, Service. He applied this experience to building prototypes of tactile components. He also helped install this summer's tactile maps and prepared braille text for the labels. His work will form the basis for exhibit elements in 2025 and beyond, while he gained valuable experience across Fort Ticonderoga's various departments to learn how a museum runs.

A Revolutionary Face Returns

 \mathbf{X} e are excited to welcome back the portrait of Frances (Fanny) Montresor Buchanan Allen Penniman after conservation treatment at the Williamstown Art Conservation Center in Massachusetts. Purchased by Fort Ticonderoga in 1910, it was one of the museum's earliest acquisitions. While she is often remembered for her 1784 marriage to Ethan Allen, Fanny's life is significant in its own right. She lived through the Revolutionary War and Vermont's disputes with New York, which led to its independence. She died as a U.S. citizen, mother to two West Point graduates and New England's first Catholic nun, while also becoming Vermont's first documented botanist.

To ensure the portrait's preservation and prepare it for exhibition, conservators stabilized cracked and cleaving paint, re-lined the canvas, replaced the stretcher, and removed yellowed varnish. Her portrait will feature in A Revolutionary Anthology: Subjects, Citizens, Service, opening May 2025. Supported by the Greater Hudson Heritage Network and generous donors during our 2023 Giving Tuesday appeal, Fanny's portrait represents a young woman born into the British-American Empire, witnessing monumental change.





Fort Ticonderoga also holds the portrait of Fanny's aunt and adoptive mother, Margaret Schoolcraft. Margaret survived the Revolution and dislocation due to her British loyalties. Her portrait requires conservation for display in an exhibit slated for 2026. A grant from the Champlain Valley National Heritage Partnership will partially support preservation of this portrait for future generations and allow us to tell the full story of the Revolution. The conservation of Fanny's portrait was supported, in part, by the New York State Council on the Arts/Greater Hudson Heritage Network Conservation Treatment Grant Program administered by Greater Hudson Heritage Network. This program is made possible by the New York State Council on the Arts with support of the Office of the Governor and the New York State Legislature.

2024 Fort Ticonderoga Teacher Institute participants came from 10 different states, from Massachusetts to California, and Minnesota to Florida. In 2025, Fort Ticonderoga will be hosting 85 teachers through the Teacher Institute and the NEH Landmarks workshops.

NEH Landmarks Grant provides Opportunities for Teachers in 2025

he National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) recently awarded Fort Ticonderoga a Landmarks of American History and Culture Workshops for School Teachers grant for the summer of 2025. This grant enables Fort Ticonderoga to host **72 educators** from across the United States for a week-long workshop exploring the American Revolution through five themes: Power of Place; Subjects, Citizens, Service; Revolutionary Possibilities; Shaping Nations, Forging Identities; and Manufacturing Independence.

Participation is open to educators teaching grades 6-12 through a competitive application process that opens this November. Teachers can learn more by visiting https://nehfortticonderoga.org, which will be available in late October. The workshop titled "The American Revolution: Subjects, Citizens, and Soldiers" will be offered twice: June 22-27 and July 27-August 1, 2025, for 36 teachers each week.


Since 2011, Fort Ticonderoga has received five NEH Landmarks grants and one NEH Summer Institute grant, supporting extended residential learning for over 380 teachers from 47 states. Participants engage with visiting scholars like Ricardo Hererra from the U.S. Army War College, Maeve Kane from the University at Albany, and Holly Mayer (emeritus) from Duquesne University. Educators also immerse themselves in the vast collections of the Fort Ticonderoga

Museum, using manuscripts, objects, and artworks to explore complexities of the American Revolution from various perspectives.

Teachers will also experience Fort Ticonderoga's unique REAL TIME REVOLUTION[™] as we commemorate the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution, delving into the day-by-day events of 1775 at and around Ticonderoga.

In-Classroom Outreach

Each school year, Fort Ticonderoga's skilled educators reach more than 4,000 students in their classrooms, both in-person and virtually, with our

whole menu of outreach programs. Based on teacher survey feedback, outreach programs cover topics including the daily life of Revolutionary War soldiers, maritime trade skills, supply, geography, and networks of colonial trade.

▲ Through hands-on discovery, students piece together how Henry Knox moved cannons to the siege of Boston. This new outreach program examines the process of understanding the Noble Train of **Artillery from** different primary sources.

For high school students, Fort Ticonderoga interactively teaches critical thinking and historical literacy skills using documents, images, and objects from our Museum Collections. Beginning this school year, teachers can book "Henry Knox in the Classroom" to inspire students with the Noble Train of Artillery. Students imagine the scale of this logistical feat through non-firing reproduction cannon, oxen yokes, draft horse collars, and more. Using real primary sources, students explore historians' detective work to understand the Noble Train today.



Thirteenth Annual Garden & Landscape Symposium

Kerry Ann Mendez, an award-winning garden educator, author, and design consultant, is the featured speaker at Fort Ticonderoga's Annual Garden and Landscape Symposium on April 5, 2025. Mendez will speak on "Inspired Garden Design Lessons from Magnificent Gardens and Gardeners." Additional sessions include reimagining forests, a historical look at gardens supporting military garrisons like Ticonderoga, and an introduction to the Arnold Arboretum at Harvard University. Fort Ticonderoga's Horticulturist-in-Residence will also share what to expect for the 2025 growing season. Registration is now open by visiting www.fortticonderoga.org.


